Shabti Figures

This is a collection of Shabti figures, on display in the Ancient Egyptians gallery at Cliffe Castle Museum. A shabti figure is a small statue or figurine placed in ancient Egyptian tombs. They were inscribed with magical spells. Egyptians believed these figures would come to life in the afterlife and serve the deceased person, performing labour or tasks to ensure their comfort and well-being.

Shabti figures were made from various materials, such as wood, ceramic or stone. The shabtis in our collection are made from faience pottery, which was a type of glazed ceramic made from crushed quartz or sand. It has a distinctive shiny and brightly coloured finish.

The number of shabtis placed in a tomb would depend on a person's status and beliefs about the afterlife. The concept of shabtis reflects the Ancient Egyptian emphasis on ensuring a smooth transition to the afterlife and a continuation of a comfortable existence.
